

Have you thought about:

Those tests? Get with your counselor on the right tests to take (PSAT, SAT, ACT, TSI).

Dual credit courses? A great way to get ahead in both career and core courses.

Your plan after high school? Most careers require some sort of education and/or training after high school. Research all the choices including apprenticeships, certificate and associate degree programs, and four year universities.

Paying for school? Explore financial scholarships, grants, and loans and understand the process to apply.


Who can help? Get with your counselor or advisor ASAP!
